53RD YEAR AT SAINT VINCENT COLLEGE



2018 TRAINING CAMP HIGHLIGHTS

The Steelers are celebrating their 53rd Training Camp at Saint Vincent College in Latrobe, Pa., this summer.

Pittsburgh has called Saint Vincent College its "summer home" since 1966.

Through their first three decades in the NFL, the Steelers held their training camps at a variety of locations, as far east as New England and as far west as Wisconsin. In 1966, for the third straight summer, training camp for the Steelers was at the University of Rhode Island.

The team was there through the first four weeks of a five-game preseason schedule. Then, after a loss in Green Bay to Vince Lombardi's Packers, Coach Bill Austin wanted the team closer to Pittsburgh because the 1966 regular season was due to open with a home game against the New York Giants on Sept. 11.

With no practice fields of their own at the time, the Steelers turned to Saint Vincent College. The team arrived in Latrobe on Aug. 29 and spent a couple of weeks on campus going through final preparations for the 1966 regular season.

In 1967, the Steelers conducted their entire training camp at Saint Vincent College.



The Steelers officially kicked off the 2018 season when the team reported to training camp on July 25 at Saint Vincent College in Latrobe, Pa.

The team's 2018 training camp includes 15 practices open to the public - including the annual night practice at Latrobe Memorial Stadium (Aug. 3).

STEELERS HALL OF HONOR

The Steelers announced their 2018 Hall of Honor class on Saturday, July 28 at the Fred Rogers Center on the campus of Saint Vincent College. Five members were announced in this year's class.

The 2018 Steelers Hall of Honor Induction ceremony will be held on Friday, Sept. 28, at Heinz Field, the weekend the Steelers host the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday Night Football (Sept. 30). Each inductee will receive a replica of a solid steel football, which will replicate the original that was given to Steelers' founder Arthur J. Rooney Sr. by the United States Steel Corporation and United Steel Workers in 1982 on the occasion of the team's 50th Season.

The Steelers' Hall of Honor, established with its inaugural class of 27 members in 2017, is comprised of former players, coaches, and front office personnel who were integral in creating and sustaining the franchise's success dating back to when the team was founded in 1933.

The Hall of Honor Selection Committee consists of Steelers President Art Rooney II, Joe Gordon, Bob Labriola, Stan Savran, Andrew Stockey, and Tony Quatrini.

CAMPING OUT

The Steelers are in their 53rd consecutive year of preseason training camp at Saint Vincent College in Latrobe, Pa.

Pittsburgh's 53-year tenure at the college is the second longest in the NFL for training camp longevity.

Only the Green Bay Packers, who have held their preseason camp at St. Norbert College in DePere, Wisc., have maintained a longer summer home for 61 years.

The Steelers are slated to appear in five nationally televised primetime games, including two at Heinz Field, during the NFL's 2018 regular season, it was announced when the NFL unveiled its 2018 regular season schedule.

Pittsburgh will open its 2018 regular season schedule at the Cleveland Browns in Week One on Sunday, Sept. 9 (CBS, 1 p.m.). The Steelers will host the Kansas City Chiefs in Week Two on Sunday, Sept. 16 for their 2018 regular season home opener at Heinz Field (CBS, 1 p.m.).

Pittsburgh's two home nationally televised primetime games in 2018 are scheduled for Week Four when it hosts the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday Night Football (NBC, 8:20 p.m.) and Week 10 when it hosts the Carolina Panthers on Thursday Night Football (FOX/NFLN 8:20).

The Steelers' three other primetime matchups in 2018 will occur on the road in Weeks Three, 11 and 14. The team will travel to face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Week Three (Sept. 24) for a Monday Night Football tilt (ESPN, 8:15 p.m.). Pittsburgh heads to Jacksonville in Week 11 (Nov. 18) to face the Jaguars on Sunday Night Football (NBC, 8:20 p.m.) and caps off its regular season primetime schedule in Week 14 (Dec.) with a Sunday Night Football game at the Oakland Raiders (NBC, 8:20 p.m.).

The Steelers' bye week will be on Oct. 21 (Week Seven).

STEELERS 2018 DRAFT CLASS

S Terrell Edmunds (6-1, 217)

Rd. 1 28th Overall

Played collegiate football at Virginia Tech where he appeared in 37 games, making 31 starts...he totaled 182 tackles, including 6.5 tackles for losses...Edmunds started all 10 games en route to recording 59 tackles during the 2017 season.

WR James Washington (5-11, 213)

Rd. 2 60th Overall

Set an Oklahoma State University school record with 4,472 career receiving yards, also the second-best receiving yardage total in Big 12 conference history...he became one of two players in school history with three seasons of at least 1,000 receiving yards and three years with at least 10 touchdown catches.

QB Mason Rudolph (6-5, 235)

Rd. 3 76th Overall

Led Oklahoma State University to a 32-9 record as the quarterback to produce the winningest record by a signal caller in school history...he finished his career holding no fewer than 54 school records, including single-season and career marks for passing yards, passing touchdowns and pass efficiency...his 13,618 career passing yards rank him fourth in Big 12 conference history.

OL Chukwuma Okorafor (6-8, 320)

Rd. 3 92nd Overall

At Western Michigan University, started each of his final 39 games... he was a first-team All-American selection following the 2017 campaign by the Football Writers Association of America.

S Marcus Allen (6-2, 215)

Rd. 5 148th Overall

Became the sixth player in Penn State football history to reach the 300-tackle mark in a career...his 321 stops rank fifth in program history... he was a first-team All-Big Ten selection in 2017, starting 13 games and recording 72 tackles (46 solo).

RB Jaylen Samuels (6-0, 225)

Rd. 5 165th Overall

Established a North Carolina State University school record for receptions in a career, finishing with 202...his 47 total touchdowns place him second in program annals and he finished fourth in touchdown receptions (19) and sixth in touchdown runs (28).

DT Joshua Frazier (6-4, 315)

Rd. 7 246th Overall

Played in 40 career games at the University of Alabama...he recorded 28 tackles (11 solo), with 4.5 tackles for losses, 2.0 sacks, one forced fumble and three passes defended.

LB T.J. Watt became the third player in NFL history - first on Kickoff Weekend - to record 2.0 sacks and an interception in an NFL debut, accomplishing the feat in Week One at Cleveland. He joined Charles Glaze (Oct. 4, 1987) and Tommy Haynes (Oct. 4, 1987).

The Steelers tied for ninth in the NFL with 16 interceptions on the season.

Pittsburgh ranked seventh in the NFL in holding opponents to an average of 19.3 points per game.

Pittsburgh clinched the 2017 AFC North title to mark the team's 23rd division title, eighth since 2002 and the third in the last four years (2014, 2016 and 2017).

The Steelers clinched a playoff berth for the 30th time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger in 2017 - the most playoff berths by an NFL team in that span.

PITTSBURGH - The Steelers sealed a 31-28 victory over Green Bay with a 53-yard field goal from **K Chris Boswell** - a career long and the longest field goal from a Steeler in Heinz Field history.

Pittsburgh found the end zone on its opening possession for the second week in a row when **QB Ben Roethlisberger** connected with **TE Xavier Grimble** on a 1-yard touchdown pass. After an unsuccessful extra point attempt, the Packers pulled ahead 14-6 with a pair of touchdown passes from Green Bay QB Brett Hundley on back-to-back Packers' drives.

Pittsburgh tied things up with a 17-yard touchdown pass from Roethlisberger to WR Martavis Bryant, followed by a successful two-point conversion on a pass from Roethlisberger to **WR Antonio Brown**. But the Packers pulled ahead again on the opening drive of the second half when Green Bay WR Davante Adams broke free after a pass from Hundley, resulting in a 55-yard touchdown.

An interception from Roethlisberger gave Green Bay an opportunity to increase its lead, but a pair of sacks on Hundley by Steelers **DEs L.T. Walton** and **Cameron Heyward** gave Pittsburgh the ball back. The Steelers capitalized on the ensuing drive with a 1-yard touchdown pass from Roethlisberger to Brown.

A second sack from Heyward on third down forced the Packers to go three-and-out on their next drive, setting up Pittsburgh to take it's first lead since the first quarter with a touchdown pass from Roethlisberger to Brown - Roethlisberger's fourth touchdown pass and Brown's second touchdown catch of the night.

Once again, the Packers responded with a touchdown of their own, tying the game at 28 with 2:02 remaining in the fourth quarter. Pittsburgh was forced to punt on the following drive, but the Steelers defense kept the Packers at bay with the help of a 6-yard sack on Hundley by rookie **LB T.J. Watt**, which allowed the offense to get the ball back with 0:17 remaining in regulation.

A diving catch by Brown on a 23-yard pass from Roethlisberger along the Steelers' sideline set up Boswell's game-winning 53-yard field goal.

Brown finished the game with 10 catches for 169 yards, while **RB Le'Veon Bell** amassed 183 yards from scrimmage and set a Steelers record with 12 catches - the most by a running back in a single game in franchise history.

Mike Tomlin, the 12th-year head coach, has guided Pittsburgh to a 36-16 overall record in regular-season primetime games.

He is 12-2 on Monday Night Football, 17-8 on Sunday Night Football and 7-6 on Thursday Night Football.

TOMLIN AT HOME

Mike Tomlin has guided the Steelers to a 65-23 career regular-season record at Heinz Field.

Tomlin earned his 50th regular season home win in Week Nine in 2015 vs. Oakland and joined Chuck Noll (119) and Bill Cowher (85) as the third head coach in Steelers history with 50 regular season home victories.

Tomlin has led Pittsburgh to at least five home wins in each of his first 11 seasons - through 2017 - as the team's head coach and six home wins in eight of his 11 at the helm through 2017.

Mike Tomlin coached the Steelers to a 6-0 sweep of the AFC North in 2017 - the second season since becoming the team's head coach in 2007 that he has earned an unbeaten mark in divisional play (2008 and 2017).

12-PLUS IN

Mike Tomlin produced a career-best 13 wins in 2017 with the Steelers - his fourth season as the team's head coach with at least 12 regular-season wins since becoming the team's head coach in 2007.

Since 2007, Pittsburgh's four seasons with at least 12 regular-season wins are tied with the Denver Broncos for the second-most 12-win seasons in the NFL (New England: 9).

TOMLIN'S 100TH IN 10

Mike Tomlin became the third head coach in Steelers history to record 100 regular season wins in Week 14 of 2016, with the team's 27-20 victory at Buffalo.

He joined Chuck Noll (1969-91: 193) and Bill Cowher (1992-2006: 149) in the team's 100-win club to make the Steelers the first NFL franchise with three 100-win head coaches.

Tomlin earned his 100th regular-season victory in Week 14 of 2016 at Buffalo in his 157th career regular-season games to mark the fewest games by a Steelers head coach to reach the century mark in the win column (Chuck Noll: 158 and Bill Cowher: 163).

Tomlin's 100th win occurred in his 10th season with the Steelers, becoming the first Pittsburgh head coach to reach 100 wins in his first 10 years (Bill Cowher: 1992-2001: 99 and Chuck Noll: 1976-78: 88).

Tomlin also joined an elite head coach fraternity in NFL history by reaching 100 wins in his 10th season:

- He is the ninth head coach in NFL history to win 100 games in his first 10 seasons with one franchise, joining Bill Belichick (New England), Mike Ditka (Chicago), Joe Gibbs (Washington), John Madden (Oakland), Mike McCarthy (Green Bay), Marty Schottenheimer (Kansas City), Mike Shanahan (Denver) and Don Shula (Miami).

FEWEST TO 100

Mike Tomlin reached 100 regular-season wins in 157 games, the sixth-fewest games to reach 100 career victories among coaches who began their career since 1970:

TOMLIN GOING FOR TWO

QB Ben Roethlisberger connected with **WR Antonio Brown** on a two-point attempt in Week 12 vs. Green Bay in 2017, the team's second successful two-point attempt of the season.

Pittsburgh converted three of its nine two-point attempts in 2016, their first two conversions both coming in the first quarter of games (Oct. 2 vs. Kansas City and Oct. 16 at Miami).

The Steelers converted 8-of-11 two-point attempts in 2015. Their eight successful two-point conversions set a new NFL record in a single season.

CONTROLLING THE NORTH

QB Ben Roethlisberger quarterbacked the Steelers to a 12-3 record, including a 5-0 mark vs. AFC North foes, in his 15 games played and started during the 2017 regular season.

Roethlisberger became the first quarterback in NFL history to record three 500-passing yard games in a career with a 506-yard performance in Week 14's AFC North Division clinching win against Baltimore at Heinz Field (39-38). He set single-game team records for pass completions (44) and pass attempts (66).

Roethlisberger earned his 125th regular-season victory as a starter in the 26-9 win against Minnesota in Week Two. He completed 23-of-35 passing for 243 yards with two touchdowns for a passer rating of 104.8 in the win.

In Week Five, Roethlisberger's 312 passing yards marked the 50th 300-yard game of his regular-season career to become the 11th quarterback in NFL history to throw for at least 300 yards in 50 regular-season games and the ninth to do so with one team.

Roethlisberger made his 150th career regular season start in Week 8 vs. Indianapolis in 2014 to become just the fourth quarterback in NFL history to record 100 wins in their first 150 regular season starts (Tom Brady: 116, Joe Montana: 108, Terry and Bradshaw: 102).

Roethlisberger registered his 90th career win in his 135th career start, becoming the fifth fastest quarterback who began their career in the Super Bowl era to reach 90 wins.

He earned his 130th win as a starting quarterback in his 192nd start in Week 10 of 2017 at Indianapolis to mark the third-fewest starts in NFL history to win 130 games (Tom Brady: 168 and Peyton Manning: 189).

QB Ben Roethlisberger is 54-17 (.761) as a starter against AFC North opponents during his career and led the Steelers to the best divisional record during the 2013 and 2014 regular seasons (4-2) and in 2016 (4-1).

Since 2010, Roethlisberger is 30-10 against divisional foes during the regular season.

FACING THE NFC

In 51 career regular-season games against NFC opponents, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** has posted a 35-16 record, including winning each of his first seven starts against conference members.

Roethlisberger completed 23-of-35 passing for 243 yards with two touchdowns for a passer rating of 104.8 in Week Two's 26-9 win at Heinz Field against the Minnesota Vikings, and tallied his first 300-yard game of 2017, leading the Steelers to a 20-15 win at Detroit in Week Eight, finishing with 317 yards, including a 97-yard touchdown connection with **WR JuJu Smith-Schuster**. He completed 33-of-45 passes for 351 yards with four touchdowns and two interceptions for a passer rating of 106.8, leading the Steelers to a game-winning drive for the 41st time in his NFL career (regular season: 37 / postseason: 4) in a 31-28 win vs. Green Bay on Sunday Night Football in Week 12.

THE 45 AND 50,000 CLUB

QB Ben Roethlisberger became the eighth quarterback in NFL history - first in team history - to reach 50,000 passing yards in regular-season career games - a feat he accomplished in Week 13 of 2017 at Cincinnati. He reached 50,000 passing yards in his 197th regular-season game to become the fifth quarterback in NFL history to reach the milestone in fewer than 200 games.

Roethlisberger became the first player in Steelers history to register 45,000 career passing yards in Week 10's game vs. Dallas. He was the 11th quarterback in NFL history to reach the mark, the eighth to do so with one team, and the fourth active signal caller with 45,000 passing yards.

BEN GOING OVER 90

QB Ben Roethlisberger threw his third touchdown of 94+ yards in Week Eight's 20-15 win at Detroit in 2017, becoming the first quarterback in NFL history with three touchdown passes of 94+ yards and the fourth in NFL history with three touchdown throws of 90+ yards, joining Len Dawson, Joe Montana and Billy Wade.

His 97-yard connection with **WR JuJu Smith-Schuster** is the longest passing play in franchise history and ties as the longest offensive play in franchise record books.

WR Antonio Brown led all NFL players with 1,533 receiving yards in 2017 and finished fifth with 101 receptions on the year, despite missing the final two games of the season due to injury.

Brown eclipsed 100 receiving yards in eight of his 14 games of 2017, and added 10 or more catches in six.

Brown opened the 2017 season setting a new team Kickoff Weekend record for receptions with 11 for 182 receiving yards - the second-most by a Steeler in a Week One matchup. His 182 receiving yards marked the 30th 100-receiving yard game of his NFL career, breaking a tie for the most such games in team history.

In Week 11 vs. Tennessee, Brown caught three touchdowns for the second time in his NFL career in a game, finishing with 10 catches for 144 receiving yards.

Smith-Schuster ended his regular-season rookie year becoming the first rookie in Steelers history to record a kickoff return for a touchdown (96 yards) and a touchdown catch (20 yards) in the same game in Week 17 vs. Cleveland. His 265 combined yards (143 receiving + 122 kickoff return) were the second-most by a rookie in Steelers history (273, Charles Johnson, Dec. 24, 1994 at San Diego).

He totaled a single-game career highs in receiving yards (193), including a 97-yard touchdown catch-and-run from **QB Ben Roethlisberger** in the team's Week Eight 20-15 win at Detroit. The 97-yard connection is the longest pass play in team history and ties as the longest offensive play in franchise annals. His 193 receiving yards marked the second-most by a Steelers rookie in a single-game, behind Jimmy Orr's 205 on Dec. 13, 1958.

In Week 15 vs. New England, the rookie wide receiver posted the second 100-yard game of 2017, leading the team with 114 yards on a team-best six catches. His 69-yard catch-and-run is the second longest reception of his NFL career.

His five touchdown catches are the most in NFL history by a player before his 21st birthday (turned 21 on Nov. 22).

RB Le'Veon Bell finished the 2017 regular season third among all NFL players in rushing yards (1,291) and second in yards from scrimmage (1,946). He rushed for at least 100 yards in four games, while adding at least 100 scrimmage yards in nine.

Bell led all players with a game high 186 yards from scrimmage (144 rushing yards on 35 carries / 42 receiving yards on four catches) and scored two rushing touchdowns in the team's 26-9 Week Four win at Baltimore.

The Michigan State product tallied 179 rushing yards - tying as the tenth-most in a regular-season game in Steelers history - and the fourth-most in his NFL career in the team's Week Six win at Kansas City.

Bell led all players in rushing yards (134 on 35 carries) and yards from scrimmage (192: 134 rushing / 58 receiving) in Week Seven's 29-14 win vs. Cincinnati at Heinz Field.

On Sunday Night Football in Week 14 against Baltimore, Bell totaled 125 yards from scrimmage (48 rushing / 77 receiving), scoring three touchdowns (two rushing / one receiving) to mark his third game with at least three touchdowns, tying Jerome Bettis and Antonio Brown for the most such games in team history. It is his eighth regular-season game of his NFL career with multiple touchdowns.

RB Le'Veon Bell became the third player in Steelers history with at least 3,000 rushing and 1,500 receiving yards in Week Six at Miami in 2016, joining Franco Harris and Merrill Hoge.

Bell reached the 3,000 rushing and 1,500 receiving yard mark in his 38th career regular-season game, surpassing Edgerrin James (42 games) for the fewest games in NFL history to reach the milestone.

RB Le'Veon Bell eclipsed 200 rushing yards for the second time in his NFL regular-season career in Week 14 at Buffalo in 2016, racking up a franchise record 236 yards. It marked his second 200-rushing yard performance (204: Nov. 17, 2014) to tie him with Willie Parker for the most 200-rushing yard games in team history.

THE OUTLAW JESSE JAMES

TE Jesse James' 2017 regular season totals include single-season career highs in receptions (43) and receiving yards (372) yards with three touchdown catches to match his single-season best (2016).

James caught six passes for 41 yards with two touchdown catches in the Steelers Week One 21-18 win at Cleveland. It was the first career multi-touchdown game of his NFL career – and marked the 10th such game by a Steelers tight end since 1960 and the first since 2012 (Heath Miller, Sept. 23, 2012 at Oakland).

He hauled in two passes for 42 yards, including a career-long reception of 32 yards from **QB Ben Roethlisberger** in the second quarter of the team's Week Eight 20-15 win at Detroit.

In Week 11 vs. Tennessee, James caught five passes for 21 yards, including a one-yard touchdown pass from Roethlisberger in the fourth quarter, matching a single-season career high of three touchdown receptions (2016).

James set single-game career highs in receptions (10) and receiving yards (97) in Week 14's 39-38 win vs. Baltimore on Sunday Night Football in 2017.

SEEING DOUBLE

DT Cameron Heyward recorded 2.0 sacks in four separate games during the 2017 regular season.

Since entering the NFL in 2011, Heyward has recorded six multi-sack games during the regular-season in which the Steelers are 6-0.

WILLIAMS ON THE 'D'

LB Vince Williams set a single-season career high and finished second on the team with 8.0 sacks during the 2017 regular season, surpassing his previous mark of 2.0 in 2016, and ranked third on the team's defense with a single-season career best 88 tackles (68 solo).

He posted his first career multi-sack game, finishing with 2.0 against the Chiefs in Week Six.

The Florida State product sacked Indianapolis QB Jacoby Brissett in Week 10 for a loss of four yards in the fourth quarter.

Williams brought down Tennessee QB Marcus Mariota for a nine-yard loss in Week 11, increasing his 2017 sack total to 6.0. He finished the game with 7 tackles (6 solo), three quarterback hits, 2 tackles for losses and 1.0 sack.

Williams started each of the team's 16 regular season games in 2017, and established a single-season career high 88 tackles (68 solo), along with a career-best 14 quarterback hits and adding 11 tackles for losses.

DAVIS IN YEAR TWO

S Sean Davis started each of the Steelers' 16 regular-season games in 2017, and finished with a team-best and career high 90 tackles (69 solo), along with a career bests in interceptions (3), passes defended (8) and tackles for losses (7), to go along with 1.0 sack, two quarterback hits and a defensive forced fumble.

Davis recorded at least 8 total tackles in four games, including the first double-digit tackle games of his NFL career with 10 vs. New England in Week 15 and a career high 12 vs. Baltimore in Week 14.

In the Week 17 regular season finale vs. Cleveland, the team's 2016 second-round Draft selection posted his sole sack of the season, and hauled in his third interception of the year.

HILTON MAKING AN IMPACT

CB Mike Hilton joined the Steelers' practice squad in December of 2016, and started four-of-16 games played with Pittsburgh in 2017, recording 54 tackles (42 solo), 4.0 sacks, two interceptions, eight quarterback hits and 10 tackles for losses and six passes defended.

Hilton set a single-game career high with 3.0 sacks and added 6 tackles (all solo) in Week 16 at Houston. He became the third Steelers defensive back with 3.0 sacks in a game since the statistic became official in 1982, joining Troy Polamalu (Sept. 18, 2005 at Houston) and Carnell Lake (Nov. 30, 1997 at Arizona). He tallied the first sack and interception of his NFL career in the Steelers' 26-9 win at Baltimore in Week Four. His sack, a six-yard takedown of Baltimore QB Joe Flacco came in the third quarter, and his interception off of Flacco in the fourth quarter.

In Week 11 vs. Tennessee, Hilton picked off QB Marcus Mariota on the Titans' first offensive possession of the game - marking the Steelers' first of four interceptions in the team's 40-17 win.

HADEN JOINS THE STEELERS



CB Joe Haden, a two-time Pro Bowl selection, made his Steelers debut, appearing in the 91st game of his NFL regular-season career and posted six tackles and 1.0 sack, on Kickoff Weekend of 2017 at the Cleveland Browns. He brought down Cleveland QB DeShone Kizer for a sack of three yards to end the first half – his first sack with the Steelers – third of his NFL career – and first since Sept. 11, 2011 (with Cleveland). In Week Seven vs. Cincinnati, Haden hauled in the 20th interception of his NFL career and his first as a Steeler, picking off Cincinnati QB Andy Dalton in the third quarter.

Since entering the NFL in 2010, Haden has recorded 108 passes defended - the third-most among all NFL defenders:

The University of Florida product was a first-round (seventh overall) draft selection of the Browns in 2010. He has started 92-of-101 games played in the NFL and his career numbers include 389 tackles (316 solo), 20 interceptions, 108 passes defended, four forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 3.0 sacks.

BURNETT AND BOSTIC ON THE D

S Morgan Burnett and **LB Jon Bostic** joined the Steelers as free agent signings during the 2018 offseason.

Burnett spent his first eight seasons in the NFL with the Green Bay Packers. The Georgia Tech product was a third-round (71st overall) draft selection of the Packers in 2010. He started all 102 regular season games played for Green Bay as well as 11 postseason contests. His career numbers include 683 tackles (485 solo), 44 passes defended, nine interceptions, eight forced fumbles and 7.5 sacks.

Bostic joined the Steelers after spending the 2017 season with the Indianapolis Colts, where he recorded 97 tackles and 1 sack. Previously, Bostic played for the New England Patriots (2016), and the Chicago Bears (2013-15). He was a second-round (50th overall) draft selection of Chicago in 2013 out of Florida.

WATT IN ROOKIE YEAR

LB T.J. Watt - the Steelers' first round selection the 2017 NFL Draft - recorded 52 tackles (39 solo), 7.0 sacks, 10 tackles for losses, 12 quarterback hits, eight passes defended, an interception, a forced fumble and blocked a field goal attempt in 15 games played, all starts, in his 2017 rookie season.

Watt's 7.0 sacks topped the 2017 NFL rookie linebacker class - tied for second among all NFL rookies - and are the second-most by a rookie in Steelers history:

Watt started his regular-season career in historical fashion. He became the first player to record at least 2.0 sacks and an interception in an NFL debut on Kickoff Weekend since sacks became an official statistic in 1982. - Boswell converted his sole field goal attempt in Week 12 as time expired on a game-winning and career-long 53 yard try - marking the longest field goal by a Steeler in Heinz Field history, tying as the longest kick by an NFL player at the venue and tying as the fourth-longest field goal in franchise record books.
- He made each of his three field goal attempts in Week 13 at Cincinnati, improving to 20-of-20 on field goal attempts in his regular-season career against Cincinnati and 24-of-24 including the postseason.
- Boswell made each of his four field goal attempts in the team's 39-38 Week 14 win vs. Baltimore, establishing a new single-season career high for field goals made with 32 (29 in 2015). He converted a 46-yard game-winning field goal - the fifth game-winning kick in his regular-season career and fourth of 2017 (within one minute of regulation or overtime).
- In Week 15 vs. New England, Boswell converted his sole field goal attempt of the game - a 51-yard field goal in the second quarter - the sixth successful field goal of at least 50 yards in his NFL career - all occurring at Heinz Field.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. – Pittsburgh snagged a victory over the defending Super Bowl champions in the team's first preseason game of 2018.

The Steelers opened up the scoreboard with a 71-yard touchdown pass from Steelers **QB Landy Jones** to **WR JuJu Smith-Schuster**.

Philadelphia pulled ahead by one point after QB Nate Sudfeld found TE Dallas Goedert in the end zone for a 15-yard touchdown, followed by a successful two-point conversion.

Pittsburgh recaptured the lead with a 3-yard touchdown run by **RB Fitzgerald Toussaint** followed by a Steelers' successful two-point conversion attempt.

On the ensuing drive, Steelers **CB Cameron Sutton** picked off Sudfeld to give Pittsburgh a short field, but an interception by Pittsburgh **QB Joshua Dobbs** allowed Philadelphia to regain control. The Eagles capitalized with 63-yard touchdown pass from Sudfeld to **WR Shelton Gibson**. The extra point attempt failed.

The Steelers bounced back in the final minutes of the half when Dobbs found rookie **WR Damoun Patterson** in the end zone for a 29-yard touchdown.

The Pittsburgh defense held Philadelphia scoreless in the second half, as **K Chris Boswell** kicked three field goals before time expired.

Patterson led all receivers with six catches for 77 yards and a touchdown in the 31-14 win.
